Climate Crisis: Avocado Plantations



- Massive deforestation
- Uses community water
- Global warming moves fields higher
- Narcotraffickers control production (violence)
- MNCs control packing/export (profits)

Impact on land and Indigenous communities



Community loses access to forests for foraging, medicines, heating, picnics



New insect plague destroying pines: government ignores local solutions

Community solutions: inject pines with natural inputs



Gather "weeds" from forests



Cook natural herbicide, fungicide, insecticide

Keep youth from migrating and build local economy









Melipona: bees are central to life















